

## Foster Care and Kinship Services

### **Foster Care**

This year KID Foster Care Broward served 371 children through our network of 140 loving and safe foster families. KID Foster Care Palm Beach saw a 52% increase in the number of children served over the previous year supporting 319 children in 94 foster families. While our team was able to support a larger number of children, more than 10,000 children remain in the Florida foster care system awaiting homes. For this reason KID focused much of its time recruiting new foster parents through orientation meetings and training courses. The result was an additional 28 homes in Broward and 7 homes in Palm Beach.

KID is keeping sibling groups of varying sizes and ages together as opposed to separation into multiple homes and locales. Opened in November 2013, the two Family Foster Homes on the Broward County Campus have provided shelter to 11 children in 3 sibling groups.

## Kinship

Kinship at KID experienced tremendous growth throughout the year with the collaborative efforts of Legal Aid Service of Broward County and Memorial Healthcare System. The program was integral to keeping 100% of children out of the dependency system by stabilizing families and providing guidance to relative caregivers. Throughout the year Kinship offered families enrichment opportunities such as the first annual Kinship Conference at the African-American Research Library and Cultural Center which was very well attended.

In April the team's hard work was recognized by Broward County when Kinship received the "Best Collaboration" award at the 211 Broward Non-Profit Academy Awards for the partnership with Memorial Healthcare System and Legal Aid Service of Broward County.

### Adoption Support

To better serve the needs of our children transitioning into adoption, KID Adoption, and Family Counseling Center therapists were part of a coalition training on Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy. This year our team helped more than 30 community children navigate the adoption process.

In January KID helped one special child who had lived in four different foster homes in less than two years. The child was suffering from severe behaviors due to the transitions, but through attachment/adoption therapy the behaviors decreased, the child bonded with his forever family, and was adopted in January 2014.

# Family Strengthening

### **KID FIRST**

This year KID FIRST provided family intervention support to a total of 2,345 children and families, surpassing last year's total of 1,891 children and families. Not only did this outstanding program increase the number of families served, but it also exceeded all program expectations in an annual audit conducted by Children's Services Council in December 2013.

### **KID Homebuilders**<sup>®</sup>

KID HOMEBUILDERS® helped a record 262 children in imminent danger of removal from their homes, more than doubling the number of interventions from the year prior. Understanding the precarious nature of the families in KID HOMEBUILDERS®, the team met with 82% of families within the first 24 hours of intervention. Due to the team's efforts, 94% of families successfully completed the program and stayed together.

### **KID Healthy Start**

KID Healthy Start served 1,371 children and families this year, and initiated several educational outreach programs in the community. In one program KID collaborated with Babies R' Us and successfully launched monthly breast feeding and basic baby care classes at Pembroke Pines and Lauderhill stores.

### **KID Healthy Families**

KID Healthy Families continued its track record of outstanding family education. By assisting 435 children and adults through a variety of educational programs. In addition to established group discussions, forums, and activities, the program initiated family-friendly events, including a holiday celebration in December and a back to-school event in July.

# **Therapeutic Services**



## **KID** Visitation

KID facilitated visitation for 93 children and 65 adults throughout the fiscal year providing a secure environment for parents and children to interact.

KID Safe Visitation, the only accredited visitation program in Broward County, offered 26 children safe contact and productive visits with non-custodial parents in the presence of the Visitation Specialist. The program provided 5 weekly visits for 1.5 hours per family over a 4-to-6 week period. Visitations occur on the KID Leo Goodwin Foundation Campus, a fun site that boasts two beautiful playgrounds and visitation rooms full of toys for every age group.

KID Safe Visitation achieved the two outcome measures required by ChildNet: 100% of children remained free from abuse and neglect during visitation; and 100% of parents with a history of domestic violence or physical abuse demonstrated non-violent interactions with their children.

### Coordinated Family Services

Coordinated Family Services (CFS) worked diligently to help parents throughout Broward County meet outlined goals of treatment and learn valuable coping skills to reduce stress and combat negative behaviors. Through their hard work, the team celebrated the reunification of 43 children with their families after receiving services.

In February a CFS client was so thankful for the support that he shared his testimony with the KID Board of Directors. He discussed the struggles and successes he experienced in both parenting support elements and individual counseling.

### Family Counseling Center

The Family Counseling Center (FCC) provided therapeutic services to 759 children, treating a wide range of issues including: infant mental health, positive parenting, grief/loss, divorce, anger management, ADD/ADHD, anxiety, and school adjustment, among others.

The FCC team completed 410 Comprehensive Behavioral Health Assessments (CBHA). These assessments are integral in assisting ChildNet develop case plans for parents who are working toward reunification with their children.

## **Educational Services**

## **KID Preschool PLUS**

This fiscal year brought growth and expansion to the education and curriculum at KID Preschool PLUS. All staff became trained and certified in Positive Behavior Support. We added the Democracy of Children curriculum, and our classrooms expanded beyond physical walls to include an outdoor learning area complete with reading centers, courtyard activity areas, and a "tree stump activity".

All 22 children in VPK classes graduated to Kindergarten ready to continue their education. In an emotional and fun-filled ceremony, each child danced up the aisle to Pharrell's "Happy" to commence the morning's festivities.



### MOST Aftercare/ Summer Camp

For 133 children in Broward County, after school hours and summertime days were filled with educational fun.

Aftercare students planted a butterfly garden at Birch State Park for a community service project with the guidance of the Youth Environmental Alliance. Several students received six weeks of recorder lessons culminating in a concert on Family Fun Night. Summer campers enjoyed field trips, swimming lessons, and tennis lessons, while continuing to receive academic enrichment to ensure their success in the coming school year.

Celebrating its first year this past April, the Tennis Tuesday program equipped 22 children with weekly tennis lessons at Hagen Park during aftercare and summer camp.

# **Supportive Housing**

Audrey Beaufort HEART Clinical Case Manager At KID Since 2009





In October the HEART program transitioned from the planning stage to an implementation phase. Families referred by ChildNet and the Broward Sheriff's Office Division of Child Protection Investigations who met a list of criteria were triaged by the HEART team. Our Technical Assistance Team from the Urban Institute in Washington, DC, randomized a control group for the groundbreaking study. In nine months the HEART team placed 30 families in homes, representing 105 children and adults. This innovative housing and collaborative initiative continues to shine.

The initial reactions and interactions with families have helped KID and its partners better understand the emerging situation of families at-risk for homelessness, and involved in the child welfare system. The HEART team has been fully dedicated to helping reunify 15 children with their families, providing 46 children with beds - some of whom never had their own - and even welcoming a new baby boy nicknamed "Rocket" because of his quick delivery.

One of only five locations across the nation to be selected to participate in this prestigious study, the KID HEART initiative has quickly become the leader, setting the standard for identifying, triaging, placing in homes and supporting at-risk families. The KID HEART team presented at the National Child Abuse Conference in New Orleans, and has visited other locations to share its expertise and best practices.

## **Health Services**

### **KID Dental Clinic**



At KID Dental Clinic the emphasis on learning served the dual purpose of training future pediatric dentists while teaching every child about the importance of oral hygiene and the benefits of a healthy lifestyle. This year the clinic served an average

of 19 children per day with a total of 3,983 patient visits to the clinic. Throughout the course of the year, the KID Dental Clinic helped train 280 third- and fourth-year dental students and 16 pediatric dental residents.

### The Eye Care Institute at KID



450 third- and fourth-year optometry students from Nova Southeastern University, under the supervision of NSU faculty members, received hands-on education using state-of-the-art technology found at The Eye Care Institute at KID. The program

has found a foothold in South Florida, seeing 3,686 children and adults through 5,314 visits.

Since our incorporation 1,358 KID employees have helped grow our programs, shape our mission, and create the passionate and loving environment for which we are known.

Since the launch of our Foster Care and Adoption Program, KID has provided 5,290 children with happy, loving, and safe homes.

KID has since licensed more than 735 foster families who have loved and cared for thousands of children throughout the years.

Kinship has provided guidance to

2,400 family caregivers.

The Family Counseling Center has given nearly 11,000 children and families an outlet for emotional challenges.

## Serving Our Community



KID opened affordable and accessible pediatric dental and optical care clinics which successfully completed more than 9,000 visits annually.



KID opened the first two of its Family Foster Homes, providing 11 siblings the opportunity to stay together.

KID was one of only five locations in the nation selected to participate in the H.E.A.R.T. initiative, and KID has successfully placed the first 30 families at risk for homelessness into permanent homes. Since 1979, **KID** has provided much-needed community services to more than 100,000 children and families in South Florida!




